World Book Day (WBD)



Last week we celebrated World Book Day. Mr Horton (our literacy leader) took the decision last year to stop dressing up for WBD so we could have a clear focus on books. This has worked really well and it was so nice to see children arriving

at school so excited to share their favourite books. During our assembly, staff bought their favourite books for the children to choose who to sit and have a story with. In the afternoon, the older children paired up with the younger ones to share a story together. I enjoyed seeing lots of other activities going on too – like book quizzes and extended story time. Hopefully lots of children have had the chance to spend their WBD vouchers!

PSHE this term

This term, the whole school topic for PSHE is *Drugs Education*. During this unit, children will learn the role of medicines, how they can be helpful and harmful and why it is so important to take medicines correctly. Older children will start to learn about laws about drugs and medicines.

Changing Lives Team

The Changing Lives Team were in school last week to deliver two workshops to our pupils. They worked with Class 1 and 2 to tackle gender stereotypes. This helped children understand that anyone can have any favourite colour, play with whatever toys they wish and do a job of their choice in the future. In Class 4, they taught children about body image and helped them understand how media can put pressure on young people to look a particular way. Both sessions delivered key messages and were based on issues we said were important to support our pupils.

Chess Club



We were pleasantly surprised recently to learn about how many children were interested in joining our lunchtime chess club. 48 children put their name down to join

the club. While this is amazing news, we are unable to teach all the children how to play at once so are having a staggered approach to accepting new members. We have started with those children who children the rules and how to play. Rest assured, if your child wanted to attend, they will be invited to join in over the coming weeks.

In the meantime, if they have shown an interest and you have time to dust off the chess set and show them how to play, this would be massively helpful!

Redhill Trust Update:

In the recent parent survey, it became apparent that we didn't regularly share the advantages we were noticing about being part of Redhilll Trust. Here are some events we have completed recently.

Moderation Event

We met with staff within the trust to share our writing outcomes and compare them with theirs. We discussed next steps for each school. We will be having a second moderation session next term.

Safeguarding Audit

The trust's safeguarding lead came to spend the day at school to carry out a detailed audit of our safeguarding procedures. Overall, they were delighted with the findings but were able to offer some advice to further improve what we do.

Next week, Miss Baldwin and I will be visiting Tupton Primary School to see the great work they are doing in relation to marking and feedback. We hope to bring back some fresh ideas to our school.

Grammar and Spelling Open Morning
